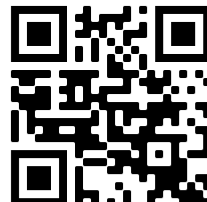

Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends, as the New Year begins we take stock of the past and look to the future. On Sunday the 5th we will celebrate the Epiphany, when strangers from the East visited the Christ Child in Bethlehem and gave him those symbolic gifts reflecting his kingship, his divinity, and foreshadowing his death on the Cross. Then we will put away all that is Christmasy and reflect on what worked and what didn't over our celebrations. Apart from hosting carol services for two of our primary schools and a number visitors at the Crib service and Midnight Mass, there is more we need to do to really engage with our wider community at Christmas in our services. Part of this may be down to publicity during a busy time for many, and it may well be that we could broaden the appeal of what we offer. Christmas is the one time of the year that people who don't normally attend church may attend a service they otherwise wouldn't. Easter doesn't draw people like the story of the birth of Jesus and all the nostalgia we bring to the season of our own Christmases past. So the onus is on us to get it right! Perhaps you have an idea you'd like to offer of what we could do in a service that could make that vital difference. Feel free to share them with me please.

In other news the Red Envelope appeal has met with some success. We have five new donors who have joined our stewardship scheme and, with increases from other generous parishioners we have almost £5,000 of new donations. That is good news. Unfortunately giving across the board is down due to people moving away or having to adjust their financial support due to the economy and personal financial pressures. In spite of the worst of the crisis being behind us, the pain is still felt across many families and households as prices remain high. Altogether we now have a £10,000 shortfall for the coming year which will necessitate a hard look at what we are doing and can we make cuts to our spending. Energy prices have stabilised in the short-term, but we may be able to navigate the uncertainty going forward. We have made it this far and God has been very good to us, but we are aware that we have not increased our Parish Support payments to the Diocese for several years and they have borne the burden of inflation and rising costs across the Diocese and we would like to be able to meet our commitment to the wider Church. We will see what the New Year holds. In the meantime, thank you to everyone who gives of their time and resources to support our mission and service here at St. John's.

January brings changes for our committees and teams across the Parish in the

wake of our review of Governance facilitated by Harvey Howlett. Harvey has managed to get us back on track and we now have a functioning Standing Committee as mandated by law. PCC has decided on revamping our committees and cutting them down to four instead of the many different ones we have had. The Hall, governed by a separate charity, requires a committee of its own, but other areas of the Parish will fall under the umbrella of one of the other three committees: Resources, Faith and Nurture, and Mission and Outreach. Resources will manage our financial and people resources (volunteers and Parish employees), Faith everything we do in worship, teaching, and care of our congregation, Mission covers ministry to the wider community and sharing the Gospel further afield. Other groups will now either be a Team, doing something on a regular basis indefinitely, or a Working Group that takes on a time-limited task or project. It is hoped that the restructure will bring new energy and people to help us become more agile and responsive to the many things we need and could be doing as a parish church in this special place. Those “committees” that haven’t met or folded because they lost their chairperson, may find a new outlet for their energy and a place of support. All four Committees will now report directly to the PCC, while all Teams and Working Parties will relate to one of the three new Committees. Over the next few weeks members of the Standing Committee will be working with all those currently serving to work out Terms of Reference and scope of work in order to join everything up as effectively as possible. The new Working Parties may enable people new to this aspect of Parish life to take on something for the short-term and get a taste of how we work together. St. John’s certainly needs more people helping if we are to carry on delivering the outreach, ministry, and worship we do now.

Finally, we give thanks for the opportunities the New Year will bring and pray that we may meet the challenges it brings. We all have something to offer and each has a gift or talent that can make a real difference in what we offer and do. Please do consider what it is that God may be calling you to give this year.

THANKS FOR RECENT STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

We would like to thank everyone who responded to the recent Stewardship Campaign. The pledges received indicate an increase of £4,700 per annum, and Gift Aid recovery is expected to raise total income by £5,800 per annum. We set a target of £5,000 based on the 2025 budget requirements, and this has been achieved. We also hoped for five new givers, and are pleased to see that four have joined to help with sharing the financial burden of running St. John's. Whilst this is a good result, it is partly offset by the natural erosion of our giving base for a number of reasons, such as people dying, moving away or reducing their giving. We are of course, very conscious that the increasing cost of living, combined with income and pensions not always keeping up with inflation, makes the situation difficult for many people.

So, thanks again for those who did respond, and particularly for those who were able to increase their giving. We can now contemplate the 2025 budget with greater confidence that it will work. It was also very good to hear from some of the congregation that they intend to leave a legacy in their Will to St. John's.

St. John's 150

2025 marks the 150th anniversary of the consecration of the main nave of our church. The enlargement of St. John's was the vision of The Rev. Chetwynd Stapylton. We will be celebrating this in the summer and also on 7th December – the actual date of consecration. In the summer there will be a historical-cum-choral event. This will take the form of a historical narrative by Alastair Daniel with a number of large –scale anthems of the period performed by a much augmented choir. This is due to take place on Saturday 14th June at 7.30pm. It is also likely that there will be a flower festival which will run until the Patronal Festival the following week. The organ recital on 11th October will also focus on music from the same period. Finally, on Sunday 7th December there will be a cathedral style Choral Evensong with the same choral forces to celebrate the day and bring events to a fitting climax. Do put these dates in your diaries and let's take this opportunity to celebrate our heritage.

Clerk to Governing Body of Malden Parochial C of E Primary School

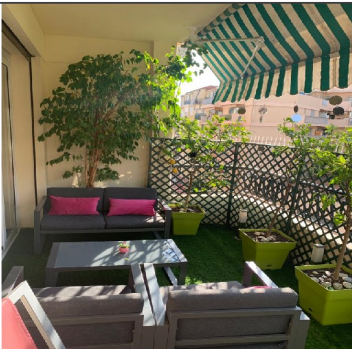
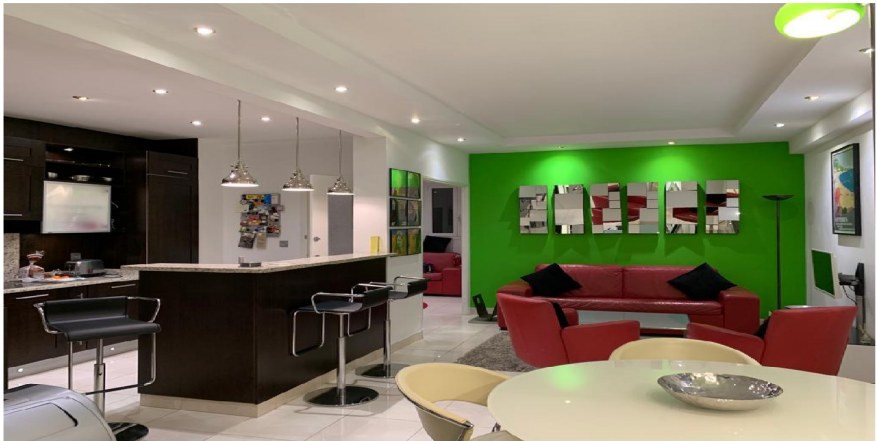
We have an opportunity for part-time work for the Governing Body of our local school.

St John's Reading Group

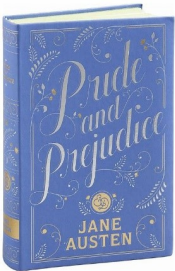

First of all, Happy New Year – and I hope that one of your New Year's resolutions is to make more time for reading and relaxation. Good for mind and body...



Our Reading Group choice for December was– ‘The Postcard’ by Anne Berest. This is an international bestseller translated from the French, and it is a deeply moving story about a Jewish family's struggle against antisemitism in wartime France and their search to maintain their identity in the face of such cruel persecution. The Vichy governments and the French police had a lot to answer for.

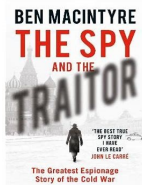
The book is almost in two halves, the first half beginning when the Berest family receive a mysterious anonymous postcard with an image of the Opera Garnier on one side, and the names of four relatives who were killed in Auschwitz on the other. The story of how two of the youngsters are taken by the Nazis, and shortly followed by the parents. One youngster hides in the garden and escapes. The second half of the book follows Anne's quest to discover the truth as to what happened to her family. A very moving novel, harrowing at times, which focuses on relationships, family and survival. A good read which the group gave an average score of 9/10.



For our January meeting, we turn to a favourite Jane Austen classic, *Pride and Prejudice*. This is Jane's second novel written in 1813 and is often described as a novel of manners, following the character development of Elizabeth Bennet. It is one of the best-loved books, but maybe we have focussed too much on TV and film adaptations rather than the beauty of the text. So here is our opportunity to re-read this great novel. It is a timely choice as 2025 will commemorate the 250th anniversary of Jane's birth in December 1775. If you are planning ahead, then on December 13th 2025 there will be a Yuletide Festival Ball in Bath to celebrate the occasion.

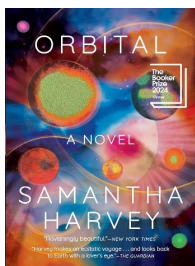


A few members of the group have opted for another book choice for January: 'You are here' by David Nicholls – author of One Day. It is the story of two lonely people who go on a walking trip and who find mutual solace. One of those heart-warming novels – just right for January.



Our choice for February is Ben Macintyre's *The Spy and the Traitor*.

Set in the time of the Cold War, it is a story of betrayal, duplicity and raw courage and was reputed to have changed the course of the Cold War. It is the story of Oleg Gordievsky, a respected KGB agent who came to detest both the KGB and the Soviet Government. Whilst in Copenhagen, he was approached by an MI6 officer and so became a double agent. A fascinating story told so brilliantly by Ben Macintyre.



Having finally caught up with 'North and South' and managed to finish reading it (9/10), I began to read the new Booker Prize winner, 'Orbital'. It is a beautifully poetic story of six astronauts who are looking down on earth from the space station. They see earth's continually changing weather patterns, the effects that humanity are having on our beautiful planet. They come to feel so very protective of their home and its spectacular beauty. At night-time, cities and coastlines are illuminated with lights and that too shows its beauty.

A gentle but very thought-provoking read which I would really recommend.

I hope that Father Christmas managed to find all the books that you wish to read and bring some surprises too.
